Newcomers have no idea



Figure out what you want/need

Create a CONTRIBUTING file

Use multiple issue trackers, and not all of them are public



Enables privacy



Development is opaque



Move to public spaces



Don't write detailed documentation



Those who need to know, know



Self-fulfilling prophecy



Add documentation



Use jargon and abbreviations



If you don't know, it's not for you Miss newcomers and non-code Expand and simplify
Use plain language and links

Unclear licensing




Postpone the decision
