- provide financial support
- promote OSS
- nurture the community
- provide training

- create new related projects
- guide how the software is developed to ensure a quality product
- host events

#### The Foundation for Public Code

#### Codebases we work with

The Foundation for Public Code helps to effectively scale codebases. We do this by supporting ambitious communities with <u>codebase stewardship</u>.

Codebases are organized by their codebase maturity.

#### Stage 1: Assessment

In this phase, codebase communities and the Foundation for Public Code decide if:

- the codebase is a good fit for Foundation for Public Code stewardship
- Foundation for Public Code stewardship will meet the community's goals and ambitions






# 2. Nine things we've learned






1. Everyone needs a sounding board.

3. Build a common understanding and vocabulary.







4. Build on any perceived benefit, then document others as they come up.






5. Talk about budgeting for change.

## Management: what you need to do

Management is responsible for on-time project delivery. stakeholder management and continued delivery of the service. They need to create the right culture, line up the right resources and provide the right structures to deliver great services.




